From Father Elias

It dawned on me that several times during the Divine Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom we hear the command “Let us be attentive”, (to take heed, give heed.) Really, this is a form of nepsis, being attentive to our inner being in which we use our senses to filter out anything that could harm our Soul. It is an act of nepsis in terms of allowing the good to enter into our inner most being and being feed by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

We hear the words “Let us be attentive’, several times in the Divine Liturgy; these times are:

1. Before the Prokeimenon
2. Before the Epistle
3. Before the Gospel
4. Before Communion

The command is issued because something important is about to happen in the Holy Divine Liturgy. St Nicholas Cavasilas says the priest admonished all present to cast away negligence and inattention and to listen carefully to what is being said and done, for that is the meaning of proshomen, “let us pay attention”. Why is it necessary? It is because forgetfulness is a great tyrant; not other human frailty defeats men so often and so easily. Now, it is necessary that our minds and hearts be in accord with the mysteries when we assist at the sacred prayers and ceremonies of the liturgy, unless we wish to attend in vain, and spend our time to no purpose.

St John Chrysostom says that we do not pay attention because we hear the same thing over and over again and we should be ashamed because it is not possible, ever to exhaust the mind of the Scriptures. It is a well which has no bottom.

St Maximos the Confessor says we should be paying attention at these times because they manifest the precepts and the will of God, according to which the way we are trained and the way we should live.

In closing, I pray that we are attentive to the wisdom of these three church fathers and do not allow forgetfulness nor repetition derail us from pursuing our relationship with Jesus Christ, but we are attentive to the will of God. We should never miss an opportunity to be fed by Christ nor should we allow time to pass and not give God His due Glory.

If music be the food of love, play on, give me excess of it." Wrote Shakespeare in Twelfth Night. Throughout my lifetime I have been lovingly feed with music: secular, classical and ecclesiastical.

It was dedication that St. Romanos, who is hailed as the Melodiost, emulated through his gift and talent of the composition of sacred Orthodox hymns. He expressed his love by writing about 1,000 other feast day hymn, feeding us through his music, even today. His feast day is October 1st, which falls on a Sunday this year; however, the first Sunday of October is proclaimed by the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America as National Church Musicians Sunday, to honor and respect our Church musicians, the choir and the chanters of the parishes. On this day, church choirs are appreciated for their volunteer stewardship of time and talent, enhancing the worship service or the Holy Orthodox Church. God loves them for their commitment and He blesses them and multiplies those blessings in their lives. The love of music is expressed through their dedication to the Church and they "...play on".

Visitors & Sacraments

Everyone is welcome in the Orthodox Church & may receive the blessed bread (antidoron) at the end of the service, but only practicing Orthodox Christians may receive the sacrament of Holy Communion.



Luke the Evangelist, October 18th This Apostle was an Antiochean, a physician by trade, and a disciple and companion of Paul. He wrote his Gospel in Greek after Matthew and Mark, after which he wrote the Acts of the Apostles, and dedicated both works to Theophilus, who, according to some, was Governor of Achaia. He lived some eighty-six years and died

in Achaia, perhaps in Patras, the capital of this district. His emblem is the calf, the third symbolical beast mentioned by Ezekiel (1:10), which is a symbol of Christ's sacrificial and priestly office, as Saint Irenaeus says.



James (Iakovos) the Apostle, brother of Our Lord, October 23rd

According to some, this Saint was a son of Joseph the Betrothed, born of the wife that the latter had before he was betrothed to the Ever-virgin. Hence he was the brother of the Lord, Who was also thought to be the son of Joseph (Matt. 13: 55). He was still called, according to the idiom of the Scriptures, the Lord's brother because of their kinship. This Iakovos is called the Less (Mark 15:4) by the Evangelists to distinguish him from Iakovos, the son of Zebedee, who was called the

Great. Having ascended the crest of the Temple on the day of the Passover at the prompting of all, he bore testimony from there concerning his belief in Jesus, and he proclaimed with a great voice that Jesus sits at the right hand of the great power of God and shall come again upon the clouds of heaven. On hearing this testimony, many of those present cried, "Hosanna to the Son of David." But the Scribes and Pharisees cried, "So, even the just one hath been led astray," and at the command of Ananias the high priest, the Apostle was cast down headlong from thence, then was stoned, and while he prayed for his slayers, his head was crushed by the wooden club wielded by a certain scribe.

The Holy Great Martyr Demetrius the Myrrh-streamer, October 26th

Saint Demetrius was a Thessalonian, a most pious son of pious and noble parents, and a teacher of the Faith of Christ. When Maximian first came to Thessalonica in 290, he raised the Saint to the rank of Duke of Thessaly. But when it was discovered that the Saint was a Christian, he was arrested and kept bound in a bath-house. While the games were under way in the city, Maximian was a spectator there. A certain friend of his, a barbarian who was a notable wrestler, Lyaeus by name, waxing haughty because of the height and strength of his body, boasted in the stadium and challenged the citizens to a contest with him. All that fought with him were defeated. Seeing this, a certain youth named Nestor, acquaintance of Demetrius', came to the Saint in the bath-house and asked his blessing to fight Lyaeus single-handed. Receiving this blessing and sealing himself with the sign of the precious Cross, he presented himself in the stadium, and said, "O God of Demetrius, help me!" and straightway he engaged Lyaeus in combat and smote him with a mortal blow to the heart, leaving the former boaster lifeless upon the earth. Maximian was sorely grieved over this, and when he learned who was the cause of this defeat, he commanded straightway and Demetrius was pierced with lances while he was yet in the bath-house, As for Nestor, Maximian commanded that he be slain with his own sword.
